This year began with very active ministry to children. With our puppet theater, we held more than ten services in January. It wasn't easy, especially in winter. Our winter this year has been snowy and cold. Not all of the buildings where we held performances for children were well heated. Some were not heated at all due to a lack of funds. reactions. They watch our presentations with enjoyment. We see how they learn new Bible stories, learn how to pray, and sing Christian songs. Of course, we can't know how effective is their childlike faith, but we believe and pray that the seed of God's Word will bring forth its fruit in the lives of these children. Thus, over and over we see confirmation that ministry to children is very important and necessary.

We enjoyed a special blessing in the children's home in Kopylov. This particular home constantly has

a turnover of children because it plays the role of receiver-distributor. Every time we meet new children and make friends with them.
Furthermore, in this children's home the leadership also constantly changes. In the past year they have had two changes of directors and several changes of workers and teachers. But, praise God, they are all very favorably inclined toward us, and we've never had any barriers to ministry from their side. Thanks to your donations, we were able to buy gifts for the children. And when we put on the Christmas



show, the kids were pleased to receive a gift too. They were especially interested to learn that the gifts had come from friends in the USA. I believe the kids were pleased to hear that friends in far-away America think about them and care for them. This is also a good testimony for adults. When they hear that brothers and sisters from America not only care about believers in Ukraine but also help homeless children, this shows them the love of God.

Please pray for the children's ministry, for God's guidance in this ministry, and for the Lord to open more doors of opportunity for ministry. Pray for the children who hear the Word of God, that the Lord will bless the seeds of Truth sown in their young hearts.
