Parents were glad to see their children performing and singing. Praise the Lord for the parents. This time, they came in much bigger numbers than we used to receive. We've especially seen many young couples. They were attentive to the Word of God. Parents were thankful for this happy week in these times of sorrow and loss.

Praise the Lord, almost all the kids from the camp visited this service to congratulate her. All of this was new to them. We saw a great interest as they listened and observed everything

attentively. Katya is the name of the girl. Her parents are not saved, but even so, they haven't prevented her from this choice. She invited them both, but only father came. He was listening attentively; this was his first time at the church. I saw tears in his eyes when all the church congratulated Katya as she came out of water. As we learned later, Katya's mother considers herself Orthodox, just as her grandmother, so for her to attend a Baptist church was a sin. But we were glad she allowed her daughter to make her own choice.

Also, we have celebrated the Harvest Day. This year our church was not crowded, but we had some unsaved people. They stayed with us after the service to share the meal and give thanks to our Lord. We also attended Radinka (a village in Chornobyl area), where we shared the Lord's Supper with the local church. The members were grateful for that.

We join them in our gratitude and want to say thank you for your love and provision for us. May the Lord bless you in your work and life and reward you a hundredfold for all you do for us.
